# **Course Description**

This one-day course is designed to provide health care professionals with a fundamental understanding of important complications associated with obesity. Effective practical treatment strategies will be discussed.

Specific topics include:

- · Childhood Diabetes and Cognitive Impairment
- · Childhood Obesity
- · Nonalcoholic Steatohepatitis (NASH)
- · Sleep apnea
- · Psychological/social barriers to weight loss
- · Role of exercise in weight loss
- · Diet plans

# Statement of Need

- ·There is a reported association between obesity related abnormalities in glycemic control and cognitive dysfunction in adolescents. Practicing clinicians need to be aware of the relationship between glucose and cognitive impairment.
- · Nonalcoholic Steatohepatitis (NASH), which is associated with obesity, can result in cirrhosis. In the past 10 years, the rate of obesity has doubled in adults and tripled in children. Because of this obesity epidemic, NASH now affects 2 to 5 percent of Americans, and is the most common reason for developing cirrhosis. Obesity also contributes to diabetes and dyslipidemia, which can further complicate the health of someone with NASH. The possibility of an individual having NASH may be overlooked, as there are few symptoms and only a liver biopsy can prove diagnosis. Practicing physicians need to recognize NASH, and be aware of possible treatment options.
- · According to the National Institutes of Health, sleep apnea affects more than twelve million Americans. Because of the lack of awareness by the public and healthcare professionals, the vast majority of patients with sleep apnea remain undiagnosed and therefore untreated, despite the fact that this serious disorders can have significant consequences. Clinicians need to recognize sleep apnea as a complication associated with obesity, and develop strategies to ensure appropriate management.
- · Adverse health outcomes may result from the reluctance of obese patients to seek medical care because of the stigma associated with obesity. Practitioners need to recognize these psychosocial barriers, and need assistance in tackling these complex issues. Practical strategies for coaching patients on life-style modifications to facilitate weight loss, including appropriate psychological support, diet counseling and exercise will be taught.

- · Address psychological/social barriers to weight loss with patient counseling strategies on healthy meals plans and the role of exercise in weight loss
