Vote Early and Vote Often

A message from the chair, Steve Abramson

It is *US News* voting season again and we urge all specialty faculty to vote on Doximity. We realize that the rankings are easy to dismiss as not representative of who we are. Like most institutions we ignore them when we don't do well and we promote them when we do. What is the *reality* behind the ranking? There are at least two: reputation and measured quality of care.

NYU has moved from 34 to top ten over the past decade largely on the basis of the objective metrics that report quality of care. Namely, 70% of the rank is calculated based on objective measures, including survival rates, designated clinical outcomes, patient safety, nursing, and advanced technologies. Reputation, however, contributes 25-30% of the final score—and reputation doesn't move easily, often following the halo effect of a prestigious parent university.

Nevertheless, there is a virtuous cycle whereby an increased *US News* rank should enhance reputation, which makes NYU more attractive in the recruitment of the best talent, whether at the faculty, trainee, or student level. So, as distasteful as we might find this competition, it is an opportunity to see how we match up against our peers and each year build upon our strengths at all levels for the future.

Thus, there is a third reality behind the *US News* rank: the external perception of our institution to colleagues and applicants. While we can't use the vaunted Chicago approach to "vote early and vote often," we do encourage everyone to vote, so that the outstanding care we provide achieves its due recognition.



The ISCHEMIA trial main results publication was named by the *New England Journal of Medicine* as one of the most notable studies published in 2020. It was one of 14 studies designated by the editors as being the most meaningful in changing medical practice and impacting patient care in 2020. ISCHEMIA, led by study chair **Judith Hochman, MD,**

Harold Snyder Family Professor of Medicine and senior



associate dean for clinical science, was also selected for the Clinical Research Forum 2021 Top 10 Clinical Research Achievement Awards, which honors outstanding accomplishments in clinical research.

A study led by co-senior authors **Ken H. Cadwell, PhD,** a member of the Skirball

Institute of Biomolecular Medicine and associate professor in the Departments of Microbiology and Medicine at NYU Langone, and P'ng Loke,



PhD, at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, found more than half of J-pouch patients develop inflammation similar to ulcerative colitis. **Jordan E. Axelrad, MD, MPH,** assistant professor in the Division of Gastroenterology and Hepatology, served as co-lead author for the study, which was published in *Gastroenterology* in December. Learn more.

Mark Mulligan, MD, received an \$18M supplement from the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) for the NYU Langone Vaccine Treatment and Evaluation Unit.

Bruce Cronstein, MD, received a \$40M Clinical and Translational Science Award from the National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences (NCATS).
